

As the year drew to a close I was reluctant to see it go. Last year was a productive time for CDD. We did extensive renovations on our retirement home in Grandview and saw 90% completion of our new semiindependent living apartments. This new year greets us with some promising opportunities, but also with much uncertainty. Like all of us in the USA, our agency staff and Board are watching expenses and maximizing our efficient use of public resources.

The 95th General Assembly opened its first session on January 7th and five days later Missouri inaugurated a new Governor. Any of us following the work of the legislature, either on the state or federal level, understands the huge challenges ahead in 2009, and what is at stake for all of us. I wish them

As mentioned in the last CELERATIONS, CDD will be using this newsletter to put out the word that we have brand new apartments nearly ready for occupancy. Our funders and referral sources are very well aware of the new Summit Apartments at 9th and Brooklyn. Like our group home opera-

tions in the area that have been successful for over two decades, we expect our new semi-independent living program to be a significant new asset to the community and a positive upward extension to our residential services. If you want a tour, give us a call. As soon as we have opened the Summit Apartments with its first few residents, we will have an open house for the public. We expect to have our city occupancy permit in early March and to close the Section 811 development with HUD in March as well.
